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Trustee's Report by David Liesse

Greetings and salutations! I hope you're all enjoying the summer, and that you haven't had too many problems with flooded basements. Most of you missed an outstanding convention in Toronto, put on by the Niagara Frontier Region in the face of great odds (the SARS nonsense, an exchange rate that actually would have been the best for Canadians coming to the US in many years, seemingly overbearing Customs regulations for train show vendors, etc.). I hope you can get to one of the conventions in the next few years: 2004 in Seattle, 2005 in Cincinnati, 2006 in Philadelphia, 2007 in Detroit, or 2008 in Anaheim.

The Board of Trustees has been working in earnest, through its Long Range Planning committee, for over a decade, trying to come up with a way to revitalize the NMRA. We firmly believe we have come up with a viable plan, which was approved a couple meetings back. To implement the plan, though, will require approval by the membership. A new set of Regulations, replacing the current Constitution and Bylaws, will be on the national ballot toward the end of the year. If you're concerned about the NMRA keeping up with the times, I highly recommend voting in favor of the revisions.

Having said that, I realize there are a number of questions and concerns about the

proposed changes. Let me say up front that no one believes that what we're putting forward is absolutely perfect. Many, many compromises were made to reach this point. It may turn out that everything will work far better than anyone could expect; more likely, we'll find that some tweaking needs to be done over time. But this is a starting point, and if the NMRA continues on its current course under its current strictures then there is a very real chance that there won't be any members left after a few years because the association has become completely irrelevant.

It would be impossible for me to address all the changes in one column; the Regulations alone are 43 pages long (believe it or not, that's a reduction in size). For full information, I refer you to the NMRA web site, www.nmra.org. If you still have questions, please ask me (e-mail works best, mwrt@hq.nmra.org). What I'd like to do here is address the top concerns that members have expressed throughout all the regions.

To start, the Regulations are being introduced in order to streamline the governing documents. Any corporation has such a set of governing documents; in most states, these consist of the Articles of Incorporation and the Bylaws (aka Regulations, depending on state law). A constitution is not required, and primarily serves to add a layer of complexity. In the Midwest Region, for example, we do have our Articles of Incorporation, our Constitution, and our Bylaws. The main purpose of the separate Constitution and Bylaws have to do with how they are amended – the Constitution requires a vote

of the membership, while the Bylaws require only a vote of the Board of Directors. In the proposed Regulations, we have made provisions for certain sections – those coming from the Constitution – to have amendments approved by the membership, rather than simply by the Board of Directors. The membership thus will not lose any rights they currently have in this regard.

One of the most visible changes is a restructuring of the Board of Directors (and the name change, due to changes in Ohio law – the NMRA is incorporated in Ohio – but that's just window dressing). The number of trustees is being reduced from 17 to 9. Instead of each region electing a trustee, there will be one elected from each of five districts, two elected at large (one from the US and Canada, the other worldwide), and one elected by the new Region Advisory Council. The final trustee will be the President of NMRA Canada (who is currently a non-voting member of the Board of Trustees). The five districts are geographical in nature, with three for the US and Canada, one for Europe/South and Central America/Africa/Middle East, and one for Australia/New Zealand/Pacific Ocean areas/the rest of Asia. This arrangement has generated some criticism, so let me address that.

First, there are those who don't like the idea of the regions losing their representation on the board. In fact of law, the regions have no such representation now. The Board of Trustees is beholden only to the Association and not to the regions, and where national and region interests conflict they have to decide what is best at the national level.

Under the new arrangement, the regions do have an official voice. The Region Advisory Council will be made up of region representatives – probably the president, in most cases, but that's not a requirement – and will have a voice on the board. They will elect their own director who will have the right to vote.

The other major criticism of this structure is the possibility of having no directors from the US, which still has the bulk of the association membership. Yes, this is a possibility, but not at all likely. Reaching that point would virtually require no candidates from the US, which in turn means the nominating committee not putting up for vote any candidates from the US.

I would also point out here that, yes, we are guaranteed to have three non-US directors: the Atlantic and Pacific District directors, and the president of NMRA Canada. This is, in fact, a good thing. I travel overseas quite a bit, and am aware of the different economic situations in different parts of the world, but most average Americans don't, and I would include a number of past and present Trustees in that category. These three areas that will have their directors all face different sets of problems, and it is important that we have valid input into the decision-making process. Although we call ourselves the National Model Railroad Association, we are actually an international organization, with tremendous overseas growth potential.

It is true that region members will no longer have a trustee/director guaranteed to be elected from their own regions. However, with the Region Advisory Council, there is still the direct channel of communication.

The other major visible change is the dues structure. You may have heard some amounts tossed around, but they are not yet set in stone and I won't even mention here what they are. The point is that once the Regulations are put into place, and on a schedule to be outlined therein, payment of dues will get you membership at all levels of the organization. Most of you will remember when that was the way within the Midwest Region, and we had to go to region dues collection because we had no income otherwise. Under the new scheme, a certain amount – still being debated at the time of this writing - will funnel down from the national level to the regions to help pay the administrative costs of running the region. What this will mean to the individual regions will vary; some are still dues-free, while the others will have to make adjustments.

There are a number of other changes included within the Regulations, but they are primarily clarifications of existing provisions. Some of the other changes include a mandatory periodic review of all departments and programs for continued viability, along with a provision that any dues increases beyond a cumulative cost-ofliving adjustment since the last increase must be approved by the membership. The current and proposed documents are all available on the web site, and I encourage you to review them to the extent you feel necessary to get a good understanding of what we are asking. When the time comes, please remember to vote, and I strongly urge you to vote in favor of the proposed changes!
